

World ocean goods and services exports, billions of dollars, 2023



Small Island Developing States' ocean exports per capita are nearly 10 times higher than the global average

Ocean exports value, dollars per capita, 2023




SIDS' ocean exports per capita were \$2641 in 2023, nearly ten times the world average, pointing to the economic importance of this export sector.

Developing countries' ocean exports are often concentrated by product and market

Theil product and market concentration indices, top 10 ocean goods exporters, 2023



Diversifying export sectors (reducing product concentration) helps economies grow while

Exporting to more trading partners (reducing market concentration) can also enable economies to reduce shocks due to sudden changes in tariff and non-tariff barriers. For instance, Mexico's exports of ocean goods are mostly sent to the United States, and Myanmar's exports to Thailand. By contrast, Türkiye and South Africa have more diversified ocean




Outcomes of 5th UN Ocean Forum: 3 - UNCTAD - UNDESA voluntary commitment at UNOC-3





- Title: Evidence-based Climate Action through Artificial Intelligence and Data Innovation for Caribbean SIDS
- Time frame: 3 years
- Objective: enhance capacities of SIDS by delivering training in fundamental data science skills, along with providing technical assistance in:
 - Making effective use of Automatic Identification System (AIS) data (for tracking vessels) and related national data to measure emissions from maritime transport and fisheries;
 - Application of Artificial Intelligence for Environment & Sustainability (ARIES), which can be used for the System of Environmental-Economic Accounting (SEEA) for ecosystem valuation and beyond GDP accounting.
- Beneficiaries: Barbados, Belize, Trinidad and Tobago, and the Dominican Republic
- **Budget:** \$800,000






Outcomes of 5th UN Ocean Forum: 4 - UNCTAD engagement in UNOC3: Blue zone



- SG is invited speaker in Ocean Action Panel 6 on "Advancing sustainable ocean-based economies, sustainable maritime transport and coastal community resilience leaving no one behind"
- Research from background note for 5th Ocean Forum was included in UNOC-3 outputs, including data and analysis for preparation of the UNOC3 background note, as well as concept notes on OAPs 3 (finance), 4 (marine pollution), 5 (Sustainable Fisheries), 6 (sustainable ocean economies), 9 (aquatic foods), 10 (international law under UNCLOS).
- Co-leading a side event with UNDP on "Integrated solutions for Sustainable Ocean Economies". Partners include Norway, Costa Rica, Chile, AUC, FAO, UNEP, UNDOALOS.
- Co-operating on 4 side events with UN-Oceans (Ocean Governance), WTO (fisheries subsidies), Indonesia Global Compact Network (A UN Task Force on Seaweed) and ODI (Financial Gaps)
